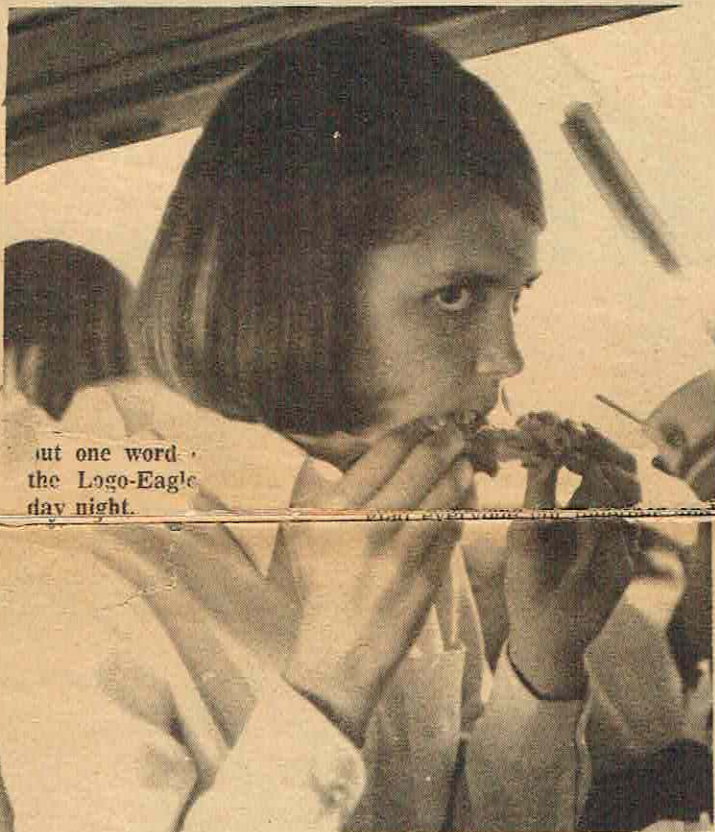

Co-captains Dave Arledge, Stan Holmes and Glenn Lowe look on. (Mullins Photo)

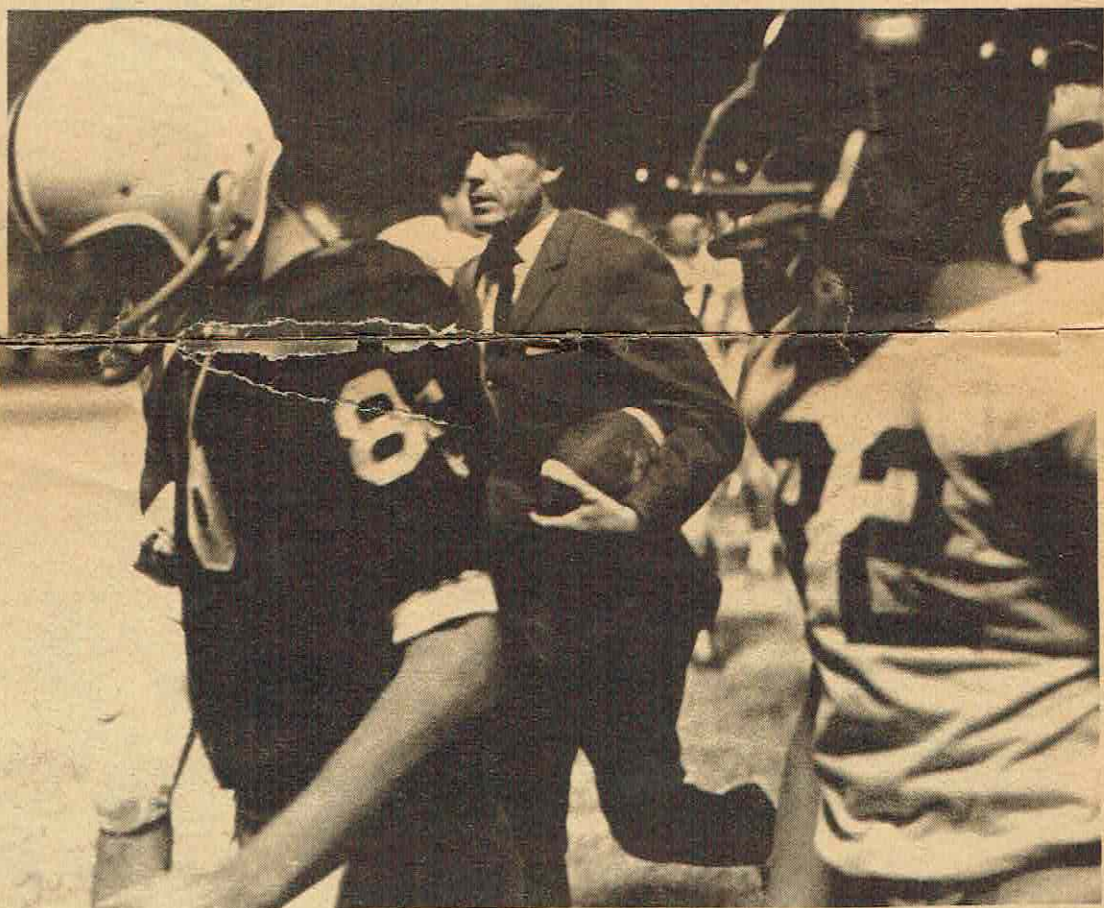

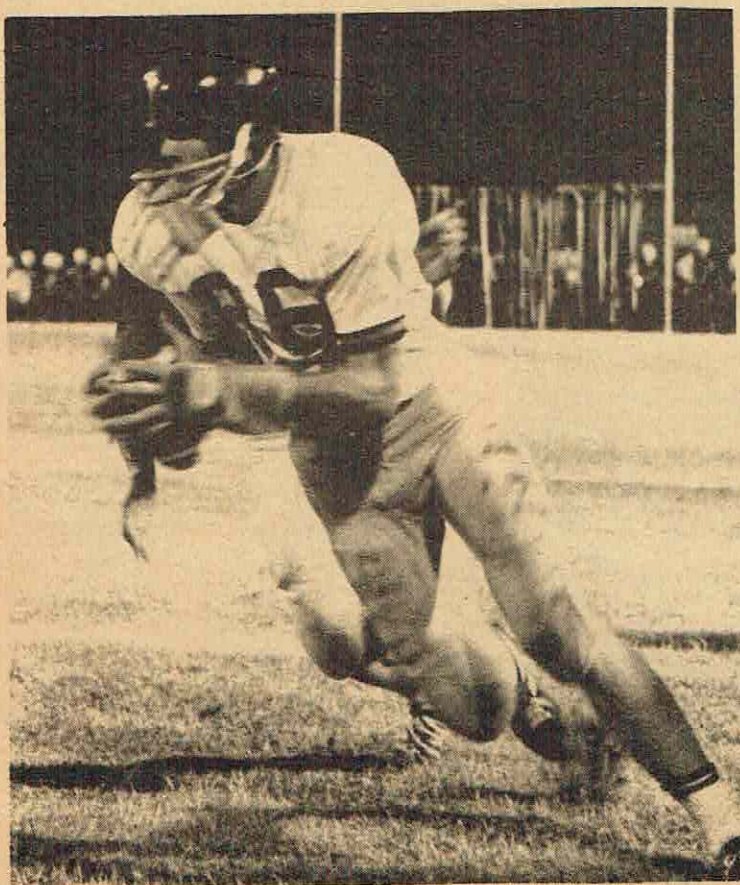

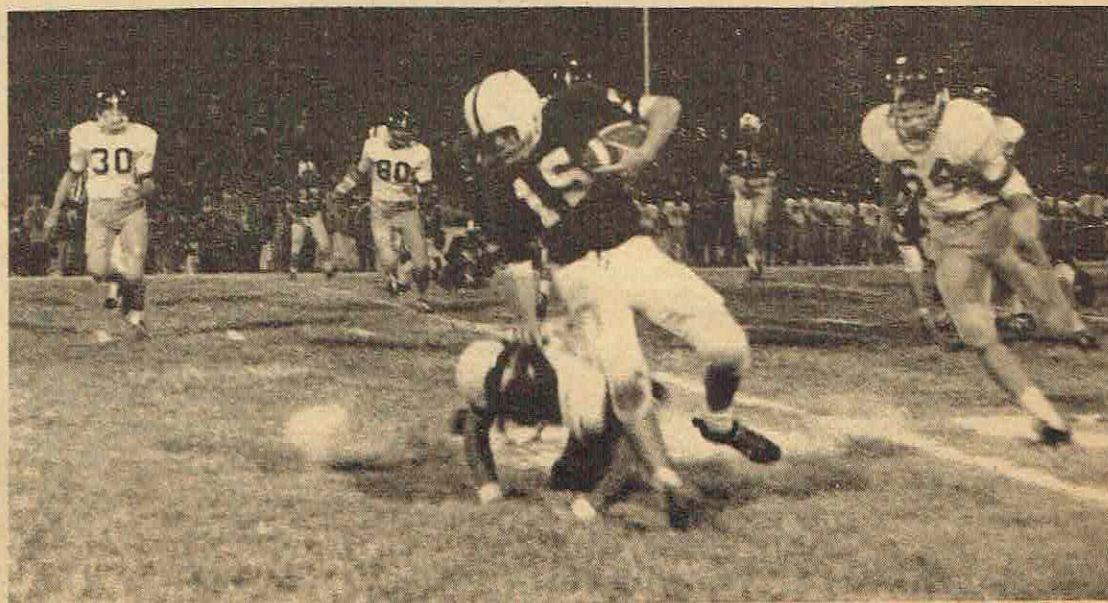

Warbird- Cougar Tilt Set

Longview Lobos Defeated 21-13

"Get a Cougar!"

This was the Warbird cry shortly after the mighty Eagles from Richardson knocked off second ranked Longview Friday night in Lobo Stadium for a 21-13 Bi-district win.

The next landing for the Warbird flight to state is the Bryan Adams Cougars. The Cougars are another top ranked team with a string of twelve victories without a loss. The game site is the Cotton Bowl, Friday night at 8 p.m.

The offensive attack of the green and white is spear-headed by Quarterback Scotty Miles along with Tailback Alan Crawford.

Crawford is the next thing to what we would call a "Swords" or a "Rogers". His rampaging running has taken much of the pressure off Miles as Miles has pin-point accuracy in finding receivers such as End Randy Dosset.

The Cougar defense can be just as commanding as the offense. Cougars Craig Johnson, Jim Thompson, Ray Riddel, Bruce Gaw, Steve Story, and Jim Wallace can apply pressure anywhere on the field.

SO THE QUARTER-FINAL TILT is set. The purple and gold Eagles do battle with the green and white Cougars to determine who advances to semi-finals.

But back to the tremendous "come from behind" Eagle victory over the Longview Lobos.

The first quarter and part of the second was a scoreless deadlock. After several exchanges of punts the Lobos mounted a drive.

Lobo Quarterback Steve Judy, Rodney Hill, and Ray Wright paced the team as the drive stalled at the Eagle 27.

Throwing wrenches in the Lobo machine were Dave Arledge, Hank Dubey, Jim Hoffman, and Gregg Jacobs.

Then lightning struck.

ON AN ATTEMPTED FIELD GOAL, Arledge, flying like a screaming Eagle, broke through and blocked it. And right there was Jim Hoffman who gathered the errant pigskin and scampered 68 yards for the first Eagle touchdown. Flippo lost the range as the point after went wide to the right.

The Lobos came roaring back on passes of 30 and 35 yards from Judy to Tailback Hill and Wingback Sistrunk.

The Warbird defense tightened and the Lobos faced a

fourth and 10. Judy connected with Tom Davis for 35 yards and a TD.

The Eagles were down 7-6. For the first time this season the Eagle team trailed at the half.

The Lobos received the second half kick-off and started at their own 31. They rolled for a 69 yard drive in seven plays. The Eagles had a seven point deficit, 13-6.

BUT THE BIG WORD in the success of this Eagle team is "determination". Many of the 12,000 fans thought the Warbirds were doomed in that the Eagles gave ground slowly but surely to the relentless Lobos. But

"determination" became the big factor.

The Wolves defense held and the Warbirds were forced to punt.

The Lobo offense began its relentless drive once more. Judy, Hill, Sistrunk, and Wright were the ball carriers and the Eagles gave ground begrudgingly.

But here Lobo Judy made a mistake. He put the ball in the air on Arledge's side of the field and Dave promptly picked it off at the Eagle 35. This proved to be just the thing to set fire the Eagle attack.

Mack Rogers, John Swords, Dave Cordell, and Bob

Dudney followed the holes punched by the front offensive line and drove 65 yards in ten plays.

The drive was capped with a 17 yard ramble by Rogers whose second and third efforts carried him right across the magic line.

However, the Eagles were 1 point short. A decision had to be made. So the big play was decided. A try for the two-point conversion was set up.

THE WARBIRD PASSING attack being almost stymied, Bob Dudney lofted one over the middle to Dewell. Dewell, unable to make the catch, bobbled it to Swords for the elusive two and the Eagles had battled back to forge ahead, 14-13. The Eagle fandom went wild.

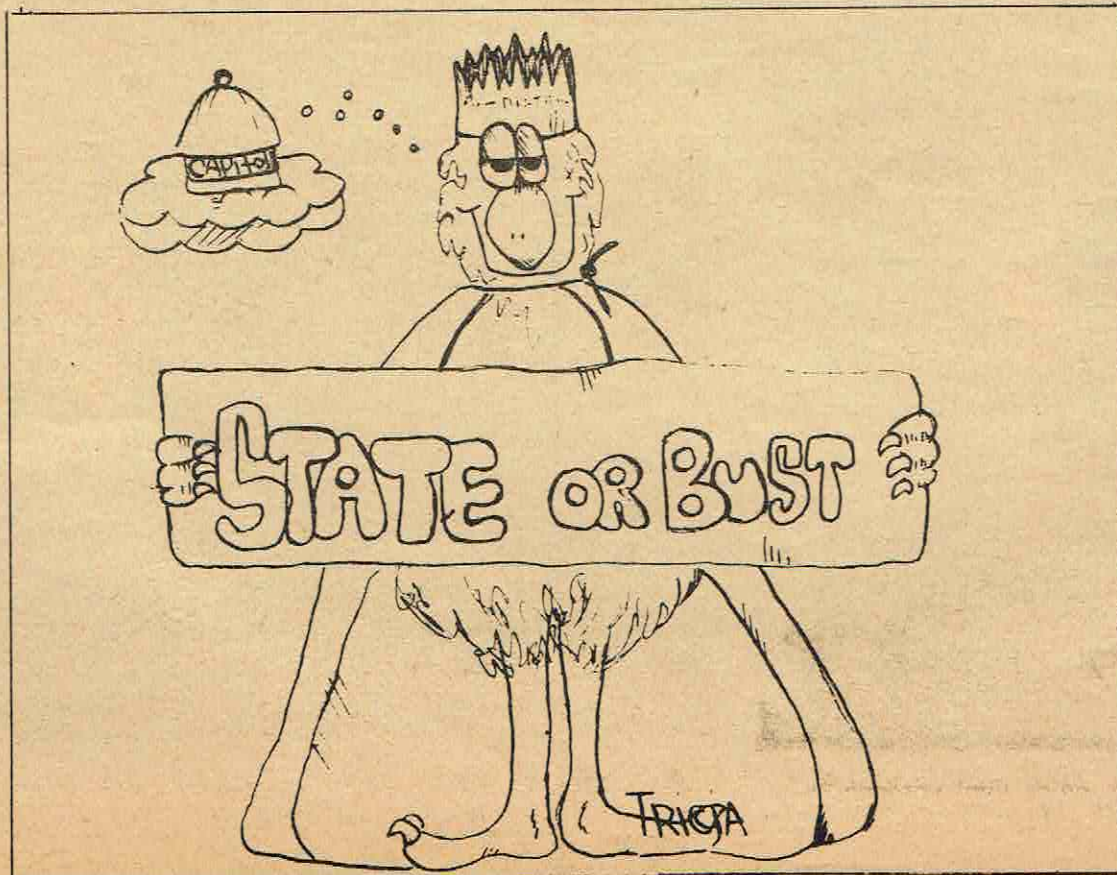
With time on the wane, the Lobos started rolling from their own 5. But Hoffman, who played a whale of a game, intercepted a Judy pass at the Eagle 26.

On fourth down, Carnahan sailed a high twisting punt to the Lobo end zone. Hill attempting a run-back, let the ball slide through and Jim Hoffman was right there waiting.

Rogers plunged forward from the one for his second TD of the night and the color of the Bi-district was purple and gold.

But up the road is a green and white Cougar, all primed and ready for a devastating feast. His own. Right Eagles?

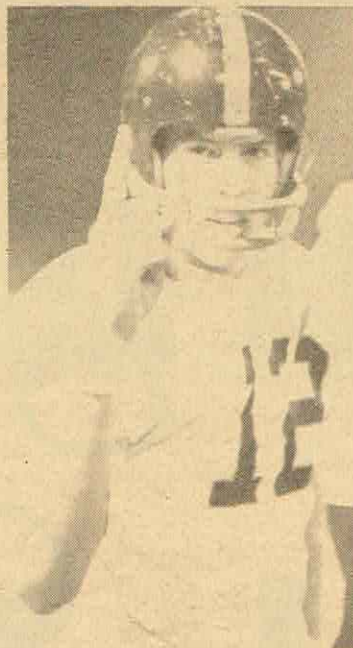
STAN HOLMES — "They were a tough team. I'm glad we beat 'em!"
